Sen. Lesser, Rep. Carpino Secure up to \$700k for Cromwell

(CROMWELL) - At midnight on May 8th, the General Assembly officially adjourned, marking the end of the 2024 Legislative Session. In the final week, State Senator Matt Lesser and State Representative Christie Carpino were proud to secure up to \$700k for Cromwell nonprofits and local town projects. Lesser and Carpino supported House Bill 5523, which allocates soon-toexpire American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to aid municipalities, schools, and nonprofits. Specifically, \$150,000 was set aside for behavioral resources in Cromwell Public Schools and \$300,000 was also allocated to install handicap accessible bathrooms at the high school athletic complex. Additionally, the Cromwell delegation helped pass bonding legislation proposing \$250,000 in potential funding to build lights for the local little league field. Both Lesser and Carpino look forward to the approval of this bonding allocation as the state's bonding commission begins their monthly meeting schedule. "After hearing reports of bullying, including racial bullying, I knew the Cromwell Public Schools needed additional support. Helping them secure funding to hire a Social, Emotional and Behavioral support consultant was at the top of my priorities," said

Sen. Lesser. "I'm also grateful to Rep. Carpino

taking the helm in securing up to \$250,000 for field lights for Little League players and \$300,000 for bathrooms at the athletic complex, I am proud of our bipartisan teamwork to support Cromwell students, families and taxpayers." "It's always a success when we can help fund local projects," said Rep. Carpino. "While not perfect, I supported this legislation because it allows us to invest in higher education, secure support for our hardworking nonprofits, and provide assistance to our local schools. Five of the six judges are reaching the state's mandatory retirement age of 70 for judges.

According to the governor's office, Lamont specifically chose to hold these special elections on the same date as the next election because doing so would enable the municipalities in each probate district to avoid any additional costs of holding separate elections for this purpose.



Newington Resident And Brother Arrested On Several Drug Charges

Vanessa Robert Avery, United States Attorney for the District of Connecticut, and Stephen Belleau, acting special agent in charge of the Drug Enforcement Administration for New England, announced recently that a federal grand jury in New Haven was charging Kyle Petersen, 38, of Newington, and his brother, Erik Petersen, known as "Peach," 43, of New Britain, with conspiracy to distribute and possess with the intent to distribute controlled substances.

The indictment came on April 15, and the prothers appeared in Hartford federal court last veek and entered a plea of not guilty.

They have been detained since April 3.

According to court documents, in May 2023, DEA New Haven Tactical Diversion Squad members began investigating suspicious packages being delivered to Kyle Petersen's Newington residence.

At the time, Petersen was under federal supervision after a federal conviction in 2017 that involved the trafficking of fentanyl and prescription pills.

During the investigation, a court-authorized search of a package mailed to Petersen contained more than 400 grams of pills containing Protonitazene, which is a synthetic opioid typically more potent than fentanyl.

Court documents said that the investigation revealed that Petersen had received approximately 34 similar packages mailed from the same source in Michigan and also received approximately 46 packages mailed from California and Oregon suspected to contain multiple pounds of marijuana.

Invesetigators also made controlled purchases of counterfeit Percocet pills containing fentanyl from Kyle's brother, Erik Petersen.

Kyle and Erik were arrested on federal criminal complaints on April 3.

According to DEA, on that date, a search of Kyle Petersen's residence revealed more than a kilogram of counterfeit Adderall pills containing methamphetamine, counterfeit oxycodone pills containing fentanyl, counterfeit Xanax pills, a large quantity of Protonitzaene with approximately 40 grams of cocaine, and \$76,650 in cash.

If the brothers are convicted of the charge in the indictment, based on the types and quantities of controlled substances attributed to each defendant, Kyle faces a mandatory minimum term of imprisonment of 10 years and a maximum term of imprisonment of life, while Erik faces a maximum term of imprisonment of 20 years.

The indictment also seeks the forfeiture of the cash seized from Kyle's apartment, as well as an additional \$57,530 in cash seized from a bank account and Kyle's 2014 Porsche Cayenne.

Kyle faces additional penalties if he is found to have violated the conditions of his supervised release.

State Funding Announced for John Wallace Middle School

State bond funds approved by legislature for renovations HARTFORD — State Representatives Kate Farrar (D-West Hartford, Newington) and Gary Turco (D-Newington, New Britain), and State Senator Matt Lesser (D-Cromwell, Middletown, Newington, Rocky Hill, Wethersfield) announce the approval of \$8,038,180 in state bonding funds for the renovation of John Wallace Middle School in Newington, after the passage of HB 5524 in the Connecticut House of Representatives and Senate. This grant is a 75% reimbursement rate from the state for the total cost of the project.

Funds are to demolish and rebuild the interior spaces of three wings in a new configuration of the school to optimize functionality and meet the needs of 21st-century education. One vital aspect of this project is to enhance security measures, with the installation of new security doors to improve safety within the school premises. The project will also include upgrades to the HVAC and electrical systems.

"It is a great day for Newington students and families," said Rep. Farrar. "I'm proud to secure over \$8 million for the John Wallace Middle School renovation project. This is nearly \$2 million more in state funding than originally

planned, further reducing the costs for Newington taxpayers. All students, teachers and school staff deserve a high-quality and safe learning environment. Newington voters overwhelmingly approved this project and Senator Lesser, Representative Turco and I are thrilled to deliver on this promise."

This renovation was one of our top priorities for this legislative session and is an essential project for our community. I am also very proud of our work to secure \$1.8 million more than what was originally expected when it passed out of the Education Committee," said Rep. Turco. "Our students deserve a modern facility and an optimal and safe place to learn."

"I am so pleased that we have secured support for a 75% reimbursement rate for the school construction project at John Wallace Middle School, saving taxpayers over \$8 million," said Sen. Lesser. "Now with final approval of these critical funds, this grant will help offset the cost of much needed repairs to improve security, technology, and classroom size?

The John Wallace Middle School renovation project was approved by Newington voters in a referendum vote in the November 2023 election. The bill now goes to the governor's desk.

Council Votes To Allow Use Of Kycia Farm, Seek Bids For Long-Term Master Plan

In two separate actions, the Town Council has authorized Town Manager Fred Presley to go out for bids on creation of a Kycia Farm concept plan for using the property at Kycia Farm and to open up the property to approved community uses immediately.

Direction on the first motion noted that the Kycia Farm Master Plan to be prepared by the chosen consultant should be a holistic approach for all the town-owned land known as Kycia Farm "and its adjacent lands," bearing in mind the fu-ture needs of the Board of Education and the Elementary Schools Building Committee, and the needs for sporting facilities and public recreation. Council member Carbone wanted to know

what was meant by adjacent properties. According to Presley, this is public property that directly abuts the Kycia Farm property.

On the first Sunday in June, since 2002, the Richard M. Keane Foundation has been proud to sponsor an annual 5k Walk/Run. The motion called for unlocking the land, with the town manager's approval for events such as concerts, shows, plays, art exhibits and other reasonable uses by the town, or by community partners. It allows for limited agricultural use, educational use, active or passive recreational activities such as walking and running trails, bird watching orienteering and other uses, all subject to approval by the town manager.

Additionally, it called for removing the private property signs, except for those that protect the house on the property, and installing new signs to invite people to use the property for public use, similar to the Wilkus Farm site, and to explore temporary parking for that purpose.

Councilor Carbone said she objected to the wordage, wondering what would be considered appropriate use.

'If someone wants to use the Cove or Mill Woods, for example, they would fill out an application," explained Presley. There are certain requirements that need to be met when a private event is held on public land.

"Any proposal would have to have a designated area where people will park, how the traffic is going to flow in and out, and might need designated people out there to guide visitors," he said.

Carbone also asked for a clarification of "limited agriculture."

'What's going on now, which has been traditionally since Kycia's owned the property, we have a local resident who continues to keep the vegetation down, plow the fields, plant the fields," explained Presley. He said the town pays him and works with him and will continue to do so as the land is opened up to ensure that equipment is stored in a safe way when the public is on the property.

Also, Presley said that the local Girl Scouts are looking into having a pollinator garden on the property, and the Friends of Kycia Farm would like to redevelop some of the greenhouses. This would include cleaning up around the greenhouses where broken glass is currently a safety issue. He said the Friends are looking into ways to fund this on their own.

Other discussion included keeping the signs up until these and other safety issues are taken care of, how to protect the house that stands on the property, and what new uses might be appropriate for the house, which is reported to be in good condition.

Both motions carried unanimously, which bodes well for turning the property around which there has been so much controversy into a viable treasure.

This is a beautiful property. It is going to be a gem for Wethersfield for generations," said Mayor Ken Lesser.

The council is hoping to have a candidate cho-sen for preparing the Kycia Farm Master Plan within 60 to 120 days.

Historic Diner To Be Displaced For **Multi-Story Apartment Building**

The town is definitely in the market for more apartment rentals, and the Silas Dean Highway can certainly benefit from landscaping and a more pedestrian-friendly environment. It appears that the new building project that was approved last week by the Planning and Zoning Commission will accomplish all that. But what wasn't so obvious, if one listened to the meeting, is that to accommodate this improvement the town must sacrifice a landmark establishment that has been serving up food, friendship and good times for decades.

P.J. Chimini, of Government Solutions Group, represented the applicants, A M Group, during last Tuesday's public hearing for a four-story mixed-use building at 718 Silas Dean Highway. The project will include 18 two-bedroom apartments, and some space on the ground floor for low volume retail offices. Having gone through meetings with the Design Review Committee, the project now includes trees, shrubs and green space. The project allows for the proper amount of parking spaces, and the P & Z approved a variance on the height requirement in this zone, so it will top out at 48 feet.

The applicants are also the owners of the gas station and the Oakland Fresh Market next door as well as the building where the Wethersfield Diner has operated since the 1950s. The diner will have to go. This fact was mentioned almost parenthetically during the application and hearing process, but is a much bigger issue than one small business moving over for a much larger business

To many residents and regular patrons, it is osing a meeting place and good friends who

welcome them. It's not just the excellent food and service that keep them coming back, it's also the

sense of belonging to something. Stacey Pribyson and her husband Wil Rivera have owned the Wethersfield Diner business since 2015, and have leased the property on a yearly basis until 2022, when the property was purchased by A M Group. She said that the owners, Essam Tinawi, Belal Basatna, and Jay Nahlawi, changed the lease arrangement to a monthly renewal at that time.

She said she was unaware of any plans that would threaten her business until the Friday before the public hearing last week, and this came in the form of a public meeting notice that was attached to the door of the diner. When she inquired about it with her landlord, she was told that nothing would probably happen there for several years.

"My mom and I went to the public hearing and sat in the audience," said Pribyson, "but we left right before the public part because there was really nothing for me to say."

'My business is over," she said. "I have to think about me and my future." Stacey said that she and her husband had elected to trim their hours of operation after the pandemic to better balance life and work. It has since been open Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. until 2 p.m. This has been a good change for them, but nothing prepared her for this.

She appreciates all the support she has gotten from friends and customers, and town officials have offered to help her find a good way to go forward. The basis of the restaurant is an actual dining car, with additional space built on. Stacey

Should home equity loans be used to pay off credit card debt?

Credit card debt could be compromising the financial security and well-being of millions of individuals. According to the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, Americans' total credit card balance in the second quarter of 2023 was more than \$1 trillion, and LendingTree reports that the average credit card balances among U.S. cardholders in December 2022 was \$7,279. Average balances are lower but still a concern in Canada, where data from TransUnion® indicates the average cardholder had an outstanding balance of \$3,909 as of the first quarter of 2023.

Effective credit utilization is a vital component of long-term financial health. The average credit card balances in both the U.S. and Canada suggest many consumers are putting their financial futures in jeopardy by relying too heavily on credit to fund their lifestyles. The good news is consumers tend to have a sense of self-awareness regarding their credit usage, as a recent NerdWallet survey of more than 2,000 adult consumers found that 83 percent of respondents acknowledged they overspend. Recognition of an over-reliance on credit could be a solid first step toward eradicating debt, and consumers who own their homes may consider home equity loans or lines of credit in an effort to tame their debt once and for all.

What is a home equity loan?

The Consumer Financial Protection Bureau notes that a home equity loan allows homeowners to borrow money using the equity in their home as collateral. Equity is the amount a property is currently worth minus the amount currently owed on a mortgage. So if a home is worth \$500,000 and homeowners have a mortgage balance of \$300,000, then their equity is \$200,000.

Why do homeowners consider home equity loans to pay off debt?

Findings Show That Pet Obesity is a Growing, Dangerous Problem

No pet owner wants to envision a visit to their local veterinary office c o n c l u d ing with a d is c ussion about their companion animal being on the cusp of seri-



ous health problems. However, a growing number of pet owners could soon be forced to confront that very scenario.

A recent survey from the Association for Pet Obesity Prevention uncovered some sobering truths about the state of pet health. In the 2022 "State of U.S. Pet Obesity" report, Ernie Ward, DVM, CVFT, the founder and president of APOP, noted that pet obesity rates in the United States have been steadily increasing over the last several decades. That's unfortunate, as Ward notes that a growing body of evidence has linked obesity in dogs and cats to a host of serious ailments and outcomes, including:

- Skin and respiratory disorders
- Renal dysfunction
- Metabolic and endocrine disorders, such as diabetes
- Orthopedic disease, such as osteoarthritis
- Certain types of cancer
- Decreased life expectancy

So how high are obesity rates among cats and gos? According to the APOP report, 61 percent of evaluated cats were classified as overweight or obese by their veterinary professional. Among that total, one in three cats was classified as obese in 2022.

Cats' canine counterparts are not faring much better. The APOP report indicates that 59 percent of dogs were classified as overweight or obese by their veterinary professionals. Though obesity rates among dogs are significantly lower compared to cats, the report still indicates that more than one in five dogs (22 percent) was classified as obese in 2022.

Another troubling finding to emerge in the APOP report is the misperception among pet owners regarding their animals' condition. The report indicates that roughly one-third of pet owners whose animals were classified as overweight or obese classified their pet's weight as "normal," "ideal" or, perhaps most surprisingly, "thin." Those characterizations were submitted prior to pet owners' being informed of their pets' assessments, which underscores how small a grasp pet owners may have regarding their pets' physical condition. Recognition of what defines a healthy weight for pets and knowledge of how to help pets achieve that

weight can ensure a healthier future for millions of pets. Pet owners are urged to speak with their veterinarians to develop a plan that ensures the long-term health of their companion animals. More information about overweight and obesity in pets can be found at petobesityprevention.org.







Cromwell's Court Maestro Chooses College

After a remarkable run on the local courts, Cromwell High School senior Victor Payne declared his decision to play Division I hoops last month.

"Blessed to announce my commitment to play basketball at Saint Francis University," Payne stated on April 15. "Thank you to my family and coaches that have helped me along the way."

Payne is a homegrown basketball prodigy that quickly became a household name across the state after serving a starring role for a Panthers program that won a trio of conference titles and a state championship over the past three seasons.

CHS boys basketball coach John Pinone said that Payne's production was a product of his dedication, saying the 6'4" swingman was, "the first one here and the last one to leave."

"First and foremost, he's a great teammate and a great person," added Pinone. "Obviously what he has done for our basketball program over the last three years is tremendous, but he's also been a great example for our younger kids because he has a tremendous work ethic."

Payne entered high school in the middle of a pandemic and made the most out of his time once the restrictions were lifted.

As a sophomore in 2022, Payne was a second-team All-Shoreline Conference (SLC) selection as the Panthers won the first of three straight SLC titles.

The following season, Payne earned allstate status and was selected as the SLC Player of the Year as the Panthers brought home another conference banner to go along with a state title trophy after defeating Ellington in the 2023 Division IV state championship.

He again was named the SLC Player of the Year and was an all-state selection this past winter, averaging over 26 points per game as a senior.

In the day and age of private schools and

player mobility, Payne said helping lead his hometown high school to multiple conference titles and a state championship made his time at CHS a little extra special.

"It means a lot," expressed Payne. "I didn't transfer because I felt like if I was good enough, coaches would find me. I never worried about that."

CHS athletic director Kelly Maher said that Payne's presence has been felt on and off the court.

"He is a role model to everyone here and in the Cromwell community," noted Maher. "He does well in academics, he's friendly, he goes to events, he puts in the work and effort. In terms of a student-athlete, he's exactly what you want."

Despite having a shortened freshman season because of the Covid-19 restrictions, Payne finished his high school career with over 1,600 points — the second most in program history.

Pinone noted that Payne became a legitimate standout on both ends of the court, taking on extra responsibility on the defensive end, particularly over the last couple of seasons.

The bigger the game, the better he played," added Pinone.

In heading to Saint Francis — a private school in Loretto, Pennsylvania - he is following the lead of his father, who played Division I college basketball at Central Connecticut State University (CCSU).

Saint Francis and CCSU both play in the Northeast Athletic Conference (NEC) and Rob Krimmel, who coaches the Red Flash of Saint Francis, played against Payne's father in college.

'Victor is a talented guard who can play a variety of positions. His length and athleticism will allow him to make an impact on both ends of the court," stated Krimmel. "I am very grateful that the Payne family is joining our family here at SFU."

Krimmel has stabilized the Red Flash

program since taking over in 2012, winning 155 games and leading the program to three NEC championship games during his tenure.

Payne said that his connections to the college, along with his desire to play basketball at the Division I level made Saint Francis an ideal landing spot.

"I'm really comfortable with the coaches and players," added Payne. "It felt like a family within a family."

Pinone believes that the Red Flash are getting an extremely versatile players that is only "going to get better."

"I think he is going to be able to help

them right away because of his ability to play the one, two, or three positions," added Pinone. "Athletically he is off the charts -you can't teach that -- and when he puts on 15 pounds, he is going to be an even better player than he is now."

Payne, who has dreamed about playing at the next level since he was young, said that the game is now a part of him.

"I don't know what I would do without basketball, it's a part of my personality," added Payne. "I just love it and I can't wait to play at the next level and play against better players that will make me better."
