



# **Combined Town, School Budgets Reflect Effective 2.8% Tax Increase**

ROCKY HILL - On Tuesday, April 16, the Town Council held a public budget meeting to discuss the town manager's proposed budget for FY 2024-2025.

Town Manager Ray Carpentino said the proposed budget focuses on long-term infrastructure and maintenance planning.

Highlights of the budget that Carpentino presented included revaluation, rating, fund balance, debt service, capital improvement reserve, expenditures highlights, revenues, mill rate, and taxpayer impact.

One of the important things that Carpentino spoke about was the grand list. From October 2022 to October 2023, real estate increased 35.08 percent, personal property decreased 2.83 percent, and motor vehicles decreased 3.5 percent.

"The decrease in personal property values reflects vacant office space due to a shift in workfrom-home schedules and the down-sizing or right-sizing of business operations," Carpentino said.

Carpentino said to "normalize" the mill rate, there would need to be 27.80 mills to generate zero change in tax revenue based on new values. One concern Carpentino had was the fund

balance. As of June 30, 2023, it is at 5.2 percent. The proposed contribution from fund balance 2024-25 is \$450,000.

The capital improvement ordinance is over a 6.0 percent transfer, which means there is zero funding for capital.

GFOA best practices include a recommended two months of operating in fund balance.

Typically, the numbers should be anywhere from 10 percent to 15 percent, not 5.0 percent.

"The focus should be building the fund balance," Carpentino said. "There should be a reduced use of debt for improvements and to build reserves for infrastructure - be proactive?

Capital improvements include establishing an ongoing reserve for education, providing a funding structure, and a reserve level of \$1,200,000 to prepare for costs without debt.

Some of the capital improvements include a tech ed and media center (GMS), athletic McVicar Bleachers, pool infrastructure (HS), front en-

trance (GMS), science classrooms (GMS), roof replacement West Hill, and HVAC Stevens. Together, these items total \$1,422,500 for FY 2025.

For infrastructure, there is a reserve level of \$1 million, which prepares for costs without debt, and there are three projects on the list for FY

2025. Those projects include the Community Farm Phase II (200,000), Belden Lane Culvert repair (750,000), and Public Works space needs evaluation/design/study (200,000). Together, these items total \$1,150,000.

For parks and facilities, there is a reserve level of \$250,000 that prepares for costs without debt.

Those projects include the Maxwell Park deck hockey replacement (\$60,000), indoor pool maintenance - repair grout, main drain (\$50,000), Elm Ridge liner or splash pad (\$50,000), and fire house number two roof replacement (\$140,000). Together, these items total \$300,000.

Other items for the town capital improvements include a year one of five purchase of \$55,000 for a 2024 Freightliner truck, year one of a lease for a F350 pickup truck at \$15,000, revaluation review at \$40,000, purchase of two electric SUV with charging station less federal credit of \$79,000, and a pending grant of a police generator at \$180,938.

The town operating and education operating budgets increased in the 2024-2025 expenditure comparison.

For the town operating budget, the pro-posed 2024-25 is \$37,267,679, compared to the \$34,393,304 at the adopted 2023-24, bringing it to an 8.4 percent increase.

For the education operating budget, the proposed 2024-25 is \$54,454,229, compared to \$51,659,153 at the adopted 2023-24, a 5.4 percent increase.

The debt service has a decrease of 2.8 percent.

The town's capital saw a 205.8 percent increase due to the proposed 2024-25, at \$2,635,848, compared to \$861,896 in the adopted 2023-24.

The capital for the board of education saw a 500 percent increase due to the proposed 2024-25 at \$1,200,000, compared to the \$200,000 in the adopted 2023-24.

> Carpentino said that tax bills will increase due to increased home and vehicle expenses.

> For 2024-25 assessed, there will be a 30 percent increase, while vehicles will see a 10 percent decrease.

> To wrap up the budget presentation, Carpentino told everyone that the town manager's proposed budget for 2024-25 would total \$103,457,435.

> This total would bring an 8.6 percent increase and a mill rate of 30.64 mills.

> This is a 5.28 mill decrease from the prior year but an increase from "normalized" at 2.84 mills.

Check-in points will be set up along the route with refreshments along the way. Lunch will be provided to all participants after the walk.


Where will the walk take place?

# **Democrats Lead Effort To Approve New Budgets For Towns, Schools**

NEWINGTON - The Town Council and Mayor Jon Trister passed the annual budget last week on a bipartisan basis, setting the mill rate at 39.68, an increase of 3.4 percent.

From the start, the Democratic council majority was guided by the need to make responsible investments in services and infrastructure, put the town on a more sustainable financial path, and limit increases wherever possible.

"Every step of the way, our team took challenges in stride so we could deliver results for working families," Mayor Jon Trister said. "We all see it - with millions of dollars in new projects and nearly 1,000 apartments in construction, approved by the prior administration, our community and its needs are changing fast. While we may have entered a post-crisis world, the needs that grew during COVID have only continued to grow."

Since the November election, the new Democratic Town Council majority has invigorated new partnerships with federal and state partners, welcomed countless new local businesses, accelerated the renovation of JWMS, led a bipartisan community arts and culture initiative, protected access to elderly nutrition, welcomed the hiring of a new Chief of Police, and more

With this new budget, the Board of Education received an increase of 5.95 percent.

"We want to thank Mayor Jon Trister and the Newington Town Council for passing a responsible, respectable budget last week," Board of Edu-cation Chair Amy Perrotti said. "You listened to the public over the last several weeks when they came out to support Newington Public Schools?

Perrotti added that the general consensus was that education should be valued, and regardless of whether they had kids in school or not, they were happy to see tax dollars going to education-even if that meant paying a little more.

'Our capital request was not funded, but it was moved to the operating budget," Perrotti said. "This was a collaborative decision to ensure we can properly fund our student's education."

Perrotti said that after several years of historically low funding, federal COVID grants coming to an end, a much-deserved contractual increase for the teachers, and the educational needs of the increasingly diverse community, this was a much-needed increase.

Perrotti thanked the Town Council for its teamwork, transparency, collaboration, and hours spent working on the budget.

We are extremely happy we are able to maintain our current programs and staffing," Perrotti said. "Thank you also to the team leadership and Dr. Brummett and her team of presenting these budgets and answering/clarifying what had to have been hundreds of questions?

Among those to comment on the budget included John Kelly, chair of the Democratic Town Committee.

"Between tax breaks to big residential developers, budgets that lagged behind inflation, and dipping into our mandated savings and one-time federal funds, the previous administration created dangerous holes in our town's long-term financial health," Kelly said. "The Democratic-led Town Council is putting us back on track."

Appropriations for the general fund were adopted for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2024, and ending June 30, 2025.

The town government has funded a total of \$6,758,585, with public safety at \$10,569,364, public works at \$6,176,691, and several other departments totaling \$143,363,915.

"By fully funding Newington's finest in the police and volunteer fire departments, we're strengthening public safety and protecting those who protect us every day," majority leader Mitch Page said.

The budget passed on Tuesday includes improvements to the town's vehicle fleet, life-saving investments in PPE, respiratory protection, and body cameras, and new resources for police officer recruitment.

"In these difficult times, so many in our community are facing hardship, which is why we worked to shore up vital local services that support our most vulnerable residents," Deputy Mayor Kim Radda said.

Radda works as an outreach nurse in the Hartford area

"While beginning to rebuild staffing at our library and senior and disabled center to pre-CO-VID levels, we've made new investments in Meals on Wheels and congregate meals, social work, hoarding relocation, and homelessness prevention, securing the largest increase to Human Services in at least a decade," Town Councilor Matt Plourd said.

Town Councilor Kathy Gonzalez, a former PTO president and mother of a Newington High School senior, commented on the budget's passing.

"Preparing for an influx of new residents while catching up with our town's diversity and meeting the needs of students and teachers, we also wanted to expand on Newington's historic commitment to our schools with the largest increase in education funding in over a decade and a half," Gonzalez said.

The result of strong collaboration between the council and Board of Education with the new budget brings expanded full-day Pre-K programs, greater support for multilingual learners and students with special needs, and new course offerings.

"We also wanted to better guide development while making badly-needed improvements to our aging infrastructure, so we've made targeted investments in planning, roads, parks, and playgrounds," Town Council member AJ Tiniakos

The new budget includes an expanded fulltime building official, a comprehensive revision of town zoning regulations, and funds that will allow the town to repair three times as many sidewalks this year as last year.

We want to thank our neighbors for their engagement over the course of the past month," Mayor Trister said. "Throughout this process, we worked to translate what we heard from you into a budget that would truly reflect not just the values of some but the values of our entire community. With this as a framework, we're continuing to build a Newington where every child receives a world-class education, every family feels safe and supported, and every member of our community has the opportunity to meet their full potential."



# **Dollars and Sense: What The Proposed Budgets Hold For Wethersfield Taxpayers**

WETHERSFIELD - It's that time of year again when the Town Council is tasked with finding a way to provide all the services the citizens of town need at a price they can afford to pay. It requires countless hours of preparation by school and town departments to create proposed budget requests, followed by meticulous reviews, the usual attempt at belt tightening, and a final result that never completely pleases everyone.

Last Monday night, the council held a public hearing to give residents a first look at Wethersfield's proposed budget for Fiscal Year 2024-25, which includes both the Board of Education side and that of the town.

On the Ttwn side, Town Manager Fred Presley said that multiple opportunities exist right now to capitalize on available federal and state dollars, if the town steps up efforts to remain grant-acceptable.

"We also face many challenges, with our infrastructure, our school buildings, our town buildings, and many of our fields are in disrepair after decades of underfunding and neglect," he said.

'I believe the town staff and this council has to address that in a way that is sensitive to the realities of the financial situation that we have in town," Presley suggested.

To provide a picture of where Wethersfield stands at present, Presley began with a summation of some recent accomplishments.

Having completed a comprehensive classification and compensation study for town employees, which had not been done for many years, adjustments were made to increase efficiency and job retention.

The brown barrel yard waste collection program rolled out to an overwhelming response, with the initial 700 barrels selling out and a reorder on its way. Purchase of a barrel includes free

pickup on a regular basis.

In conjunction with the town of Rocky Hill, Wethersfield obtained a \$640,000 Safe Streets For All grant for the Silas Deane Highway to improve safety by slowing traffic and making the route more pedestrian-friendly.

According to state mandates, the town has hired consultants to create an affordable housing plan and to update the town's Plan of Conservation and Development. The regularly-scheduled town revaluation has also begun.

Some ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act of 2021) funds have been applied to several economic development projects to incentivize businesses to locate in town, and that is beginning to show a return,

The Wethersfield Housing Authority received a \$2 million grant for renovation projects.

Both the previous council and the present one have been working on a strategic plan for the town, which will be a comprehensive document to lead the town in setting priorities and directing spending.

Presley said the town's population is roughly 28,000 with a median household income of \$108,000, and the average assessed value of a single family home is about \$176,000. The average assessed market value is \$317,000, according to Realtor<sup>™</sup> data. Wethersfield is largely built-out, he said, and it is predominantly residential, putting the lion's share of the tax burden on the residents.

The major drivers of the proposed 2024-25 Fiscal Budget for the town include contractual increases in salaries and health care costs. The Board of Education portion represents 52 percent of the total budget. Increases there are also predominantly based on contractual salaries and employee benefits.

"Public safety, physical services and public

works are also big drivers in our budget," said Presley. "The proposed budget has a mill rate of 44.87 for real estate and personal property, and the expectation is that it is going to come down as we work through the budget hearings and workshops," he said.

The Board of Education Budget

Both the town and the school district have been proactive about utilizing grant money and ARPA funds to keep expenses down in the recent past, but on the school side some of those funds are drying up. Superintendent of Schools Michael Emmett presented the Board of Education proposed budget for fiscal year 2024-25, which has already been trimmed due to shrinking state reimbursements.

"We had budgeted with a 58 percent cap on magnet school tuitions," said Emmett, but the cap was eliminated and that added \$414,000 to be accounted for in the proposed budget. The excess cost reimbursement for special education services was supposed to be 88 percent, but the state adjusted the reimbursement rate to 70.5 percent, which made for another \$378,000 surprise expense.

The district was taxed by the BOE to trim \$763,000 from its proposal before it went before the council on March 12. To do that, they had to remove an additional social worker to help with mental health issues in the elementary schools to offset grant-funded aid that is going away. They also removed the addition of a preschool section, including a preschool teacher and a preschool speech position, along with the request for three new preschool paraeducators. This was due to the state-mandated change to the age of eligibility for kindergarten attendance.

We have multiple students that will no longer be eligible for kindergarten in the upcoming school year based upon the fact that they have a birthday after Sept. 1," Emmett explained.

'In addition to that, we are also looking at the elimination of our current math interventionist positions across the district," said Emmett. These were grant-funded positions associated with the new math program that was rolled out this year

The proposed school budget currently stands at a 6.5 percent increase over last year. "As is the case every year, the bulk of our increases are based upon salaries and personal services, meaning benefits," Emmett explained.

'And in terms of supplies, I don't think I have to tell you inflation hit us hard," he said, noting that a box of paper alone has gone up 30 percent in the past two years. Also, the science of reading process called for all districts in the state to adopt a new reading program for the coming school vear. Wethersfield will be receiving state grant funds to offset that expense, but the supplies must be born in the budget. Technology expenses are going up and some of the outdated Chromebooks must be replaced because they are no longer supported.

Those who spoke during the public hearing generally supported the proposed budget, although senior citizens living on fixed incomes said increases would be difficult for them to absorb. One resident, a retired teacher, described herself as an "in-betweener." She said she works as a substitute in area schools and has seen what happens in towns where schools are under-funded. "Is there a way to look at supporting seniors?" she wondered.

The budget process continues for the next few weeks. All hearings and workshops are open to residents and can be viewed on the town's You Tube channel, including those that have already taken place. These include the public hearing from this April 15 meeting, departmental reviews on April 17, April 24 and April/25, and the regular Town Council meeting on April 29. The budget must be adopted by May 15.

# Police Chief Reviews New Budget Requests. Spending Up 7%, Including Two Patrol Cars

WETHERSFIELD - Police Chief Rafael Medina gave an overview of the police department before delivering his proposed budget for Fiscal Year 2024-25 last Wednesday evening. He said his force is budgeted at 50 sworn officers, but staffed at 45, and actively recruiting. Next, he defined the hierarchy of the department.

"The director of public safety is Town Manager Fred Presley, who I report to directly. I have a confidential secretary, a deputy chief (who I now need to replace as of yesterday), our EAP coordinator, our PIO community outreach, then three of the four division commanders are sitting up here," he said.

Of those, Lt. Gustavo Rodriguez oversees the detective division which includes six detectives; four that work general investigations, background and pistol permits, one assigned as a juvenile detective, and another attached to the DEA as a task force officer. Lt. Richard Holton is the commanding officer of the patrol bureau. He oversees the three shifts, the dispatch center, the school resource officers, DARE officers, the traffic and bike units, cadets and three officers who are assigned to the Capital Region Emergency Services team on a part-time basis.

Lt. James Buyak oversees professional standards and internal affairs, accreditation, recruitment and retentions, FOIA civil litigation, the training unit and the records unit. And Lt. Joseph Baich, who was not present that evening due to professional training, oversees an administrative sergeant, the property control officer, the court liaison, the marine unit and manages the fleet and quartermaster.

The police department also oversees the part-time animal control officer, school crossing guards, building maintenance and accident reconstructionist and budget analyst, who works with all the lieutenants during bi-weekly budget meetings

And that completes the circle, back to the this year's budget request, which Medina tracked against the one that was approved for the current fiscal year for around \$12 million.

"As of the last pay period, we have spent \$7.6 million of that budget. We have a remaining \$4.4 million, or 37 percent, with six pay periods remaining," he said.

The majority of cost went to contractual salaries, health insurance, pension, defined contribution and workers' compensation," said Medina. "So, the bulk of my budget on the personnel side goes to contractual expenditures. What we can really try to manage or mitigate is the overtime, and that's what we will talk about."

Medina said that in October of last year, the department went to a 4/2 schedule, which is four days on and two days off. "It allowed for more officers on the street and the ability to give time off without accruing too much overtime and to utilize special days as training days that are paid for

up front that don't cost us on overtime," he said.

We are starting to see a decrease, and when the new contract kicks in July 1, 2024, there are certain things that will be removed that will hopefully also reduce our overtime," he added.

Non-personnel expenditures that the chief is asking to increase in the new budget include copying, binding, and maintenance fees for law enforcement related equipment, uniforms and elevator maintenance.

We are also requesting funding for a CIP of \$75,000 for enhancement of police parking," said Medina. This was suggested by the CIAC for fiscal 2024-25 as part of the five-year plan to expand the parking lot at the police station, move fences and gates.

He is also asking for two police cruisers to replace one that is no longer serviceable and another that was dead-lined on Sept. 1, 2023 due to safety concerns with the engine. The total cost of these additions, including package installations and rifle racks is \$133,808.

Noting that the first vehicle to be replaced, a Ford utility police interceptor SUV, only has 89,000 miles on it, Councilor Brianna Zambrello asked why it was no longer serviceable.

'Our vehicles run 24/7, so the engine is con-

stantly running," Medina explained. "So, in actuality it is an older engine than what is based on 89,000 miles." Later he mentioned that he has been looking into dual batteries for vehicles so that they could be turned off and the computers would still run and be instantly available when needed.

Mayor Ken Lesser commended the chief for having made "dramatic improvements" in the police department since he came to Wethersfield in November 2021. "If you get fully staffed with 50 officers, how do you think it will affect the overtime?" he asked.

"When we get fully staffed, that's going to affect the schedule. We'll be able to plug the hole, have less overtime and more ability for our officers to take time off," said Medina. "Right now, patrol is the primary backbone of the police department, and that's where we have to concentrate and make sure our officers are out servicing the community on the patrol side."

The maximum income limit for Newington's low-income based veterans exemption program has been increased from \$45,000 (for married and single) to \$47,800 for Single and \$56,600 for Married. These new income limits are in effect for this filing period, applications are due by October 1, 2023. If you have already applied this year (having applied in 2023) there is no need to re-apply. If you are a veteran who has never been on the program and feel you may qualify, or did not qualify under old income limits, however may qualify under the new income limits – Please Apply. 

#### 4 Stretches That Can Help To Alleviate Lower Back Pain

Lower back pain is a big problem. Though that's likely no surprise to people who suffer from lower back pain, the scope of the problem is perhaps wider than many may realize.

A recent study conducted by the Institute for Health Metrics and Evaluation at the University of Washington found that lower back pain affects 619 million people across the globe. Researchers behind the study, which was published in The Lancet Rheumatology in 2023, estimate that 843 million people will suffer from lower back pain by 2050.

Lower back pain can have an adverse effect on quality of life. The good news is that people are not helpless against lower back pain. In fact, the American Association of Neurological Surgeons notes roughly 90 percent of lower back pain cases are temporary and treatable without surgery. Stretching can help individuals alleviate lower back pain, and the following are four stretches that can be performed at home without expensive equipment.

#### **Did You Know?**



No one is immune to migraine headaches, including children. According to the American Migraine Foundation, approximately 10 percent of children experience migraines. Children may be more likely to experience migraines if a parent or both parents get them. The AMF notes that children with one parent who suffers from migraines have a 50 percent chance of getting them as well, and that increases to 75 percent among children who have two parents

that experience migraines. Children may even exhibit signs of migraines as early as infancy, as the AMF reports that colic in infants is a potential early indicator of migraines in youngsters.

- keeping the lower back pressed to the floor for the duration of the stretch, which can be repeated with the opposite leg. Perform the stretch between two and four times for each leg.
- 2. Trunk rotation: When beginning a trunk rotation, lie on your back and bring the knees up toward your chest. The online medical resource Healthline notes the body should be positioned as if you're sitting in a chair. Extend arms out to the sides fully, with palms facedown on the floor. With knees together and hands on the floor, roll both bent knees to one side and hold for 15 to 20 seconds. Return to the starting position and then do the same for the opposite side, repeating several times for each side.
- 3. Cat-cow: Various yoga exercises, including the cat-cow, can help to alleviate lower back pain. The British Heart Foundation recommends beginning slowly when attempting to alleviate lower back pain, doing the cat-cow 10 times, once or twice a week. Kneel on all fours with hands flat on the floor and arms positioned straight under the shoulders and knees directly below the hips. Breathe in as you drop your stomach toward the floor, arching the back and looking up to the ceiling. Hold for one to two seconds, then reverse. Breathe out as you pull your stomach back toward the back, rounding your back upwards and dropping the head toward the floor.
- 4. Seated hamstring stretch: The seated hamstring stretch can be beneficial because Healthline notes tight hamstrings are believed to be a common contributor to lower back pain. Stretching the hamstring muscles helps to release tension in the spine. Sit on the floor with one leg out in front of you and hook a bath towel around the heel of your foot. Gently bend forward at the hips, brining the belly down to the thighs. Keep your back straight as you grab the towel so you can bring the belly closer to your legs. Healthline advises keeping the stretch until you feel mild tension in the lower back and the back of the leg. Hold for 10 seconds, rest for 30 seconds and repeat three times for each leg. Lower back pain is a common but treatable problem. These stretches and more can help people overcome lower back pain and improve their quality of life.





#### The basics of consumer credit

A strong credit score is an undeniable asset for consumers. A strong standing in the eyes of potential creditors can save consumers money on relatively short-term expenses like vehicles and long-term purchases like homes.



The virus has a long latent period then progresses so slowly that it may never affect a cat. Long-term studies show what guardians and rescuers have known for decades-that FIV cats can live just as long and as healthy, and ultimately pass away from the same causes as Non-FIV cats.

FIV is a "cat only" disease and cannot be transmitted to humans under any circumstances. Most often, FIV+ cats live long, healthy and relatively symptom free lives. It's estimated that only about 3% of FIV+ cats actually pass away from complications which is the same percentage as lymphoma or other diseases. FIV is not easily passed between cats. It cannot be transmitted casually through shared litter boxes, water and food bowls, or when snuggling or playing. It is also very rarely transmitted from a mother to her kittens. 

#### Diabetes in Cats and Dogs: What Pet Parents Need to Know

Diabetes melaffects litus scores of families, including the four-legged members of the household. According to the Veteri-Merck nary Manual, diabetes is a common endocrine disease in



dogs and cats, occurring in roughly one out of every 300 animals. Most cases of spontaneous diabetes happen in middle-aged to older dogs and cats.

Diabetes occurs when the body cannot use glucose normally. Glucose is the main source of energy (sugar) for the body's cells, and the body requires insulin to transfer glucose from the bloodstream to the cells that need it. If there isn't enough insulin or the body is unable to use insulin properly, glucose accumulates in high levels in the blood, reports the American Veterinary Medical Association.

PetMD says that there is not one single cause for diabetes in dogs and cats. For some, it is a genetic condition. Others may develop the disease due to an underlying medical condition or from being obese. Medications such as steroids also can induce diabetes in dogs and cats.

Testing for diabetes is not routine during veterinary exams. Pet owners often stumble on a diabetes diagnosis after noticing some key indicators that something is amiss with their pets, which include:

- Excessive consumption of water and increased urination that may result in accidents in a normally housetrained pet
- Increased hunger
- Cloudy eyes, which occurs particularly in dogs
- Recurring or chronic infections that can include the skin or urinary tract
- Weight loss
- Apparent weakness

Standard bloodwork and urinalysis will confirm a diabetes diagnosis. If pet owners learn their companion animals have diabetes, they must learn to accept this is a lifelong condition that must be managed properly; otherwise, untreated diabetes can lead to liver dysfunction, kidney failure and a life-threatening condition called ketoacidosis. Treatment with insulin is the standard course for pets with diabetes. Carefully timed and measured feedings to help control the balance of insulin and glucose also will be necessary.

Veterinarians can help design a diet to help with the management of diabetes. Insulin is generally injected twice per day, shortly after meals. It is very important to maintain proper insulin and feeding schedules and a proper appetite for the pet while on insulin therapy, says AVMA; otherwise, hypoglycemia (low blood sugar) can occur if the pet is not eating and absorbing enough sugar to balance the insulin injections. Vet-based and at-home monitoring of blood and urine glucose levels also is necessary.

Pet owners who suspect their animals are diabetic should schedule a visit with a veterinarian immediately, as time is of the essence in managing the disease.
