

#### **Town Offering Free Kits To Test Homes For Radon**

CROMWELL - The state Department of Public Health (DPH) and the Cromwell Health Department urge residents to test their homes for radon gas, the leading national environmental cause of cancer mortality. Health official estimate that radon is responsible for more than 21,000 lung cancer deaths each year in the United States.

A naturally occurring, radioactive gas formed from the natural decay of uranium, radon is found in rock, soil and water. While radon in outdoor air poses a relatively low risk to human health, it can enter homes from the surrounding soil and become a health hazard inside buildings.

Public Health Coordinator for the Town of Cromwell, Salvatore Nesci, says, "You can't see, taste or smell radon. People are most of the time unaware that radon could be present in the home. Testing for radon and minimizing exposure by reducing elevated levels is very important and could save your life and the lives of those we love."

The DPH recommends testing homes for radon during the winter months. It is simple and inexpensive.

Free radon test kits are available for residents of Cromwell through the town Health Department located at the Town Hall, 41 West St.



### **Town Fire Department Documents Busy Year**

CROMWELL - 2023 was an exceptionally busy year for the Cromwell Fire Department with their calls for service.

The department noted on social media that their run totals were 3,218, which is a total of 408 runs up from 2022.

Of the 3,218 calls, the top calls included EMS with 2,276, with MVA's at 173.

Residential and commercial alarms were at 177, while building fires, which included mutual aid response, was 11.

Miscellaneous calls for assistance were at 581. "2023 was our busiest year, with a 14.50% increase in call volume compared to 2022," according to fire department officials.

NEWINGTON - This is a reminder - no tax bill is sent for the second installment for the January Real Estate and/or Personal Property tax. Your January installment was included with your July tax bill. If you have misplaced the January installment, you can locate it online or call the office (860 665-8540). Supplemental Motor Vehicle tax bills will be mailed at the end of December which are for cars purchased or registered after Oct. 1, 2022.

The last day to pay without penalty is Feb. 1. All payments received on Feb. 2 will be charged interest according to CT State Statute Sec. 12-146. There are no exceptions. All back taxes must be paid prior to the new tax bills.

The tax office is open to the public and

only accepts payments by check, money order, and cash. You may also pay by mail, or drop your payment and check into the silver tax payment box located in the parking lot near the Town Hall entrance, or online www.newingtonct.gov. Do not pay back taxes online if you need a release to register a car with the Department of

#### **Legislators Welcome John Wallace Funding**

The funding is to demolish and rebuild the interior spaces of three wings in a new configuration of John Wallace Middle School to optimize functionality and meet the needs of 21st-century

One vital aspect of this project is to enhance security measures. New security doors will be installed to improve safety within the school premses. The project will also include upgrades to the HVAC and electrical systems.

"This investment is set to transform the educational experience for our Newington students and teachers," said Rep. Farrar. "I am proud to support this project to modernize our school facilities and ensure that all of Newington students have access to a safe and conducive learning en-

"Wednesday's vote by the School Construction Project Priority List Review Committee was an important step in the process for the John Wallace Middle School renovation," said Rep. Turco. "This project is essential to our community, and I am committed to ensuring it reaches the finish line with votes in the House and Senate and a signature from Governor Lamont by the time the 2024 legislative session ends in May.

"I am so pleased that we have secured support for a 58.57% reimbursement rate for the school construction project at John Wallace Middle School, saving taxpayers over \$6 million,"" said Sen. Lesser. "This grant will help offset the cost of much needed repairs to improve security, technology, and classroom size."

The John Wallace Middle School renovation project was approved by Newington voters in a referendum vote in the November 2023 election. ## Cookies Recalled From Stew Leonard's After Labeling Error Lead To One Death

A woman from New York died after going into anaphylactic shock from a severe reaction to eating cookies that had been purchased from a Stew Leonard's store in Connecticut.

On Jan. 25, Stew Leonard's, on their website, put out a recall of the Vanilla and Chocolate Florentine Cookies that were sold only at Stew Leonoard's in Danbury and Newington from Nov. 6 through Dec. 31, 2023.

The recall stated that the cookies contained undeclared peanuts and eggs. People with an allergy or severe sensitivity to peanuts or eggs run the risk of serious or life-threatening allergic reactions if they consume these products.

"Stew Leonard's is working with the Connecticut Department of Consumer Protection and the supplier to determine the cause of the labeling error," the recall on the Stew's website said. "Customers who have purchased these cookies should bring them back to Stew Leonard's customer service for a full refund."

After the death of Órla Baxendale, according to her attorneys Gair, Gair, Conason, Rubinowitz, Bloom, Hershenhorn, Steigman & Mackauf from New York, said their client, a talented dancer, was just 25 years old when her life was cut short due to anaphylactic shock resulting from a severe allergic reaction.

"Órla's passing stemmed from an unfortunate incident involving the consumption of a cookie manufactured by Cookies United and sold by Stew Leonard's, which contained undisclosed peanuts," according to a statement from the firm's website. "This tragic oversight has led to the recall of the Vanilla Florentine Cookies from Stew Leonard's stores in Danbury and Newington, CT, for the period of November 6 – December 31, 2003."

The firm also stated that in a preliminary investigation, it was revealed that Orla's death "occurred due to the gross negligence and reckless conduct of the manufacturer and/or sellers who failed to properly identify the contents of the

cookie on the packing. This failure in proper disclosure has led to this devastating yet preventable outcome"

Born in East Lancashire, UK, Órla moved to New York to pursue a career as a dancer, accord-

Stew Leonard Jr. said that over the holidays, they sold about 500 packages of the cookies and that this was an unfortunate thing that had happened.

Cookies United, in a press release dated Jan. 23, issued a statement saying that Stew Leonard's had been notified back in July about the change in the product's label.

Walker G. Flanary III, general counsel for Cookies United, said in an earlier press release claimed by Stew Leonard's that "the cookies contain peanut, which was an ingredient not disclosed to Stew Leonard's by the manufacturer."

According to Flanary, the grocery store had been contacted over the summer about the products contained in the cookies and issued this statement:

"Unfortunately, considering the tragedy of these circumstances, we need to point out that Stew Leonard's was notified by Cookies United in July of 2023 that this product now contains peanuts, and all products shipped to them have been labeled accordingly. This product is sold under the Stew Leonard's brand and repackaged at their facilities. The incorrect label was created by, and applied to, their product by Stew Leonard's."

"In the 24 hours since Cookies United learned of this tragedy, we have been cooperating with the New York State Department of Agriculture and have been informed we are in compliance with all applicable rules and regulations relating to this product. Our deepest sympathies to the family of this Stew Leonard's customer."

In another press release from Cookies United on Jan. 23, it was announced that 11 Stew Leonard's employees had been contacted about peanut ingredients on July 20, 2023.

An image of the label that Cookies United has

used in all shipments to Stew Leonard's since July 20, 2023, had correctly called out the ingredients list, including peanuts.

"We are fully cooperating with the authorities regarding this heartbreaking event. This is a tragedy that should have never happened, and our sympathy is with the family of this Stew Leonard's customer," according to Cookies United.

The CT Department of Consumer Protection and Department of Public Health are warning the public about the store's mislabeled cookies. Both the vanilla and chocolate flavors are affected.

Recently, officials announced that the cookies also contained eggs, which did not appear on the label. Eggs are one of the major food allergens identified by the FDA, and they require labeling.

Stew Leonard's president and CEO, Stew Leonard Jr., said in a video that the company's chief safety officer was never notified that the cookies contained peanuts.

"It was a holiday cookie, it was a one-shot deal, but we bought it from an outside supplier, and unfortunately, the supplier changed the recipe and started going from soy nuts to peanuts, and our chief safety officer here at Stew Leonard's was never notified," Stew Leonard Jr. said in a video.

"We have a very rigorous process that we use as far as labeling. We take labels very seriously, especially peanuts, and our chief safety officer was never notified. We didn't change the label; hence, we sold about 500 packages of these cookies over the holiday," he said.

"We're all just very, very sad about this whole thing, and you know, I want to assure you that the food you buy at Stew Leonard's is safe, the cookies you buy at Stew Leonard's are safe, and everything is labeled properly here are Stew Leonard's," he said.



### **School Board Learns Benefits of Unique Student Reading Club**

Before the business end of Board of Education meetings, it is standard practice to hear presentations about ongoing events from one of the schools in the district. Last week, a group of very articulate students from Webb Elementary introduced their school's new library media specialist, Leane Arnau, and the Nutmeg Book Club started by her and curriculum specialist Annie Kuhn.

Nicholas Safina said that Ms. Arnau came to the school in October of last year when Mrs. Murphy retired. She was previously the library media specialist at Willington Middle School. "Just like a classroom teacher, each librarian

puts his or her own special touches on the library," Nicholas said. "She has incorporated some maker space activities into her lessons, rearranged the book stacks, and is implementing lessons on digital citizenship," he reported. "She is also working to update the non-fiction collection and labeling the different sections and genres for

Matthew Kitman told the board about the new Nutmeg Reading Club. "Nutmeg books are chosen each year in Connecticut to encourage kids to read high quality literature, also known as really good books, chosen from books published in the last five years," he explained.

The books are chosen in four categories, based by the ages of the reader, and 10 books of fiction are chosen in each category.

"In December, Mrs. Kuhn and Miss Arnau had each of the fourth, fifth and sixth grade classes come to the library for what they called Nutmeg book testing," said Matthew. "They took turns telling us about each of the 10 books. They told us about the characters and what the story was

about." Afterward, he said, the students voted,

picking two favorites: "Scritch Scratch," and Leonard, My Life as a Cat."

Karina Peshi described the books that were chosen for the club to read. "Scritch Scratch is about a girl named Claire, who is being haunted by a real ghost, while she is helping her dad with his ghost tour business," she said. The girl started an investigation of her own. "In her investigation, she learned a lot about Chicago's history and a little boy who is eerily similar to the ghost boy on the ghost tour bus," said Karina.

'Leonard, my Life as a Cat" is about an alien named Leonard who is supposed to be visiting Earth as a human park ranger, but ends up on Earth as a cat instead," she said. In the end, Leonard has to decide whether to return to his planet or to stay with Olive, a girl who has taken him in.

According to Karina, every person in the book club gets their own copy of the book they choose to read. The club is open to any fourth, fifth or sixth grade student. On Tuesday mornings, Ms. Arnau leads the "Scritch Scratch" book club, and on Wednesday mornings, Mrs. Kuhn leads the "My Life as a Cat" one.

During club meetings, students talk about the characters, the plot, the story, and the problems of the story, and they make predictions about what they think will happen based on evidence from the book. "We usually read a chapter aloud together, and the rest of the time we are on our own," said Karina.

Superintendent of Schools Michael Emmett said the book club is an example of the many successful programs he has seen at Webb Elementary. The presentation is part of the Kids Empowering Kids initiative that promotes student leadership.

#### Residential Sidewalk Assistance Program

The Town of Wethersfield Code Chapter 139-1 requires that owners of properties bordering upon any street where sidewalks are present shall keep such sidewalks free from all obstructions which would endanger the safety, health or well-being of pedestrians. In the FY 23/24 budget, the Town Council allocated \$25,000 to a new Residential Sidewalk Assistance Program for the Town to complete sidewalk repairs and replacements along the frontages of residential properties. These funds can only be used to eliminate safety hazards within the public right-of-way by repairing or replacing sidewalk slabs, and are only available to residential property owners who have a demonstrated financial need for assistance.

Residential property owners that require assistance in completing this work are encouraged to

submit the attached application form, which will be reviewed by the Town's Social and Youth Services Department to determine Program qualifications are met similar to other Town assistance programs. Funds are available on a first-come, first-serve basis until expended. If you have any questions regarding the eligibility of sidewalks located along your property prior to applying, please contact the Wethersfield Engineering Department at 860-721-2850 or engineering@ wethersfieldct.gov to request a site inspection to verify that sidewalk conditions meet Program requirements. If your application is approved, the Engineering Department will be notified, and repair work will be scheduled and completed at no cost to you.

## Social Services Director Reviews Results Of Youth Survey With BoE

Last October, students in Silas Deane Middle School and at Wethersfield High School took an online survey that asked for their input regarding substance use and at risk behaviors. The survey, which has been performed at regular intervals, was last done in the local district in 2021. It is anonymous and voluntary. On Jan. 23, the Wethersfield Board of Education learned the results

Director of Social, Youth and Senior Services for the town Erica Tew said the data will be used to guide future planning, to provide prevention programs and to promote overall community awareness. She introduced the survey consultant, Bonne Smith, of B. Weyland Smith Consulting, who also happens to be a Wethersfield resident and mother of three children in the localschool district.

"The response rate was really good, about 83 percent overall," she reported. The results were broken into several categories, and she addressed some of them individually, beginning with gender identity.

"Overall, 4.1 percent of youth described themselves as transgender, non-binary, or unsure," she said. Regarding sexual identity, Smith said 14 percent of youth described themselves as gay, lesbian, bisexual, pansexual or describing themselves in another way.

The next category was gaming and consequences, within the past year. Smith said the survey showed that middle school youth are having more of a hard time stopping gaming than high school students. "Fifty-five percent of kids feel more connected with others because of gaming, but conversely we have about 17 percent who report getting into a verbal or physical fight because of gaming," she said.

The survey revealed a similar result in the social media category. "About 62 percent say they feel more connected with others because of social media and about 17 percent overall got into a fight, physical or verbal, because of social media," she said.

"On the question about having trouble stopping scrolling, checking or refreshing, we have about 32 percent of middle school and 35 percent of high school students saying that is true for them in the past year," added Smith.

When the survey was conducted in 2021, 43 percent of youth overall reported being the victim of bullying during their lifetime, but this time

the figure was 51 percent. There was also an increase in frequency of bullying.

"In 2021, we had only .8 percent saying they were bullied every day. This time it was 1.6 percent. That equates to 22 students who feel they are bullied every day, and those are the kids we are going to worry about," said Smith..

The survey revealed that about 24 percent of youth reported always or almost always feeling anxious in the past year. "That doesn't sound amazing, but it's better than it was," said Smith. She said that most reductions were seen at the middle school, where the district has added numerous programs related to mental health. Middle school anxiety improved over the last survey by 24 percent.

"The number one source of stress in both middle school and high school is academics, which is the same in every community we serve," she said.

The survey also asked questions about thoughts of self-harm in the past year, acting

on that self-harm, physical abuse by an intimate partner, being sad or hopeless two or more weeks in a row, or considering suicide in the past year. All have gone down since 2021. However 8 percent reported considering suicide in the past year, which Smith said represents 111 youth, when you do the math.

Regarding other sections of the survey, Smith said that substance use has gone down appreciably since the survey began in 2016. "One of the biggest decreases has been alcohol," she reported. One of the questions relate to where youth access these substances and who they use them with.

"I like to highlight that the number one answer is in their home, with parents' permission and at home without parents' permission," she said.

Smith's presentation was a snapshot representing pages of data and breakouts contained in the Wethersfield Youth Voices Count Survey Results 2024. All board members received a copy of the complete report.

## Nor'easters Roundball Survive Raptors

Newington boys basketball used a 10-point run that spanned the latter stages of the third quarter and early part of the fourth to take a lead they would not relinquish in a 70-62 victory over RHAM on Jan 22.

Prior to the Nor'easters scoring surge, the teams traded the lead a half dozen times in what proved to be a closely-contested Central Connecticut Conference (CCC) battle.

It was a much-needed win for a Noreasters team that was coming off a pair of one-point losses to Windsor and Torrington.

"I hope it helps us a lot; we really needed this to get over the hump. The last two games have been heartbreakers for us," said Newington head coach Scot Wenzel. "The kids played their hearts out and we needed this at this point more than anything. It wasn't pretty, but we'll take it."

Senior captain Avery Mickens paced the offense, hitting five 3-pointers and scoring a team-high 25 points.

"My teammates really helped set me up with good shots," Mickens said following the eight-point win. "Without them, I wouldn't have been able to do it."

Mickens hit three shots from beyond the arc in the first quarter as the home Noreasters stormed out to an early lead, scoring 11 of the first 15 points and expanded the lead to 22-13 after the first eight minutes.

Wenzel said that Mickens, who captains the team with fellow seniors Lebron Beckford and Adam Alexander, has been a "leader by example" this season.

"In the first half we did a good job at getting him the ball and in the second half it was a little more difficult, but he still came through with some big shots," Wenzel said of Mickens' latest performance.

Behind seniors Troy Miller and Brady Hulland, the visiting Raptors clawed their way back in the game, outscoring Newington by 11 in the second quarter to take a 32-30 lead into the half.

Miller and Hulland combined to score all 19 of RHAM's points in the quarter. Miller finished with a game-high 31 points and Hulland added 20 points in defeat.

After losing the momentum and the lead, Wenzel goal at the half was to refocus his bewildered team.

"We got away from what we were doing. It became a game of one-on-one stuff and we were playing very selfishly," recalled Wenzel. "In the second half I thought we did a better job at running some sets and getting some good looks and got back to what we did in the first quarter."

The teams traded buckets throughout the first five minutes of the third before Beckford scored in transition to narrow the deficit to two points and Alexander tied the game with a pair of free throws.

On the ensuing offensive possession, sophomore Josiah Sims made a contested layup in traffic, giving Newington the lead at 44-42 with less than a minute to play in the third quarter.

The six straight points to end the third quarter was part of a 10-0 Newington scoring spurt that bled over into the final frame.

Mickens said the sudden surge was part physical and part mental.

"The second quarter we lacked intensity, and we came out in the third quarter and brought that energy and intensity to help us get the win," added Mickens.

A 3-pointer from RHAM's Conor Sullivan narrowed the margin to 62-60 with less than a minute to play in regulation, but free-throws proved to be the difference as Newington made their final six foul shots, with Sims sinking four freebies and junior Donovan McDorman hitting two.

Sims finished the night with 17 points, while Alexander added 12 and Beckford scored 11.

Coming off the pair of one-point losses, Mickens said it was good to be on the winning end of a close game.

"I would rather play in games like this than a blowout," he added. "I love playing against good teams, it only makes you better."

With February's stretch run coming up, Wenzel hopes his team can limit mistakes and "become a smarter and a more physical basketball team."

"We have to take care of the ball and finish games like we did tonight," added Wenzel.

Mickens agreed, adding. "We have a lot of potential. We've been in a lot of close games, but this one feels good and will definitely

will lead us on the right path."

Last Friday, the Noreasters followed up the win over RHAM by beating Simsbury 58-41, upping their record to 6-8.

Next up is a road test against the Blue Dragons in Middletown tonight (Thursday, Feb 1). Tip-off is 6:45 p.m.


