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
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

Town Board Seek Input On Plan Of Development

ROCKY HILL - It's hard to know what the future will look like, but town officials are giving it their best shot as work to finalize the Plan of Conservation and Development document con-

As of the Planning and Zoning Commission meeting held on March 26, the town had received 200 responses to their published survey. The survey is available for residents to respond to until April 15.

According to town planner, Kim Ricci, the survey received close to 200 responses at the time of the meeting, and she expected more to come in. She also said the age of respondents ranged from age 20 to 94. The survey is split into multiple choice and open ended questions.

The multiple choice section allowed Ricci and her colleagues to develop some quantitative data to evaluate some of the sentiments swirling around Rocky Hill.

She noted that 30% of respondents "strongly agree" that having housing options is important to focus on, and 62% "strongly agree" that a more walkable community should be a main foundation of the plan.

Other multiple choice questions included in the survey revolved around topics like the trail system, sustainability efforts, town identity, fine arts, and others.

It seems as though the open ended questions sparked more debate and creativity from residents, as Ricci reported one respondent requested a "monorail" to be installed in town. Others had different ideas regarding transportation and accessibility in town, focusing more on the implementation of more sidewalks and a reduction in traffic.

"I noticed a theme not only in the questions, but the uh survey results," Ricci said during the meeting. "The themes were sidewalks, walkability, bike-ability, traffic calming, because of speeding, too much traffic...I'm thinking of complete streets as an overarching kind of theme there."

Other responses to the open-ended questions

included focusing on embracing the town culture, and whether or not to build more apartment complexes, which Ricci said was "50/50" between the respondents.

Some members of the public in attendance shared their feelings and concerns of the POCD process so far.

"What I'm having trouble with wrapping my head around is that we have this public meeting which a few people have shown up to, and presumably a few others are going to see, and 200, plus, people have done the survey, which is great," Allan Smith, a local realtor and member of the Rocky Hill Housing Authority, said. "But no one's really able to comment on the draft that is being proposed and sent in before it's actually done?

Following these comments, chairman Dimple Desai explained that residents are encouraged to attend any of the meetings and share their ideas. He also discussed what the next few weeks will look like for the commission, and when residents can attend to discuss the developing plan.

He said that the POCD draft is due by April 15 to the town council and Capitol Region Council of Governments for comments. The draft must then be uploaded to the town's website by May 15, which will be followed by a PZC special public meeting on June 11 for further comments and adoption.

Members also reinforced the idea that the POCD is a "living document," and they hope to revisit the plan every few months at a special meeting to make changes, updates, and listen to residents' ongoing concerns.

"This POCD is generic enough that anything that can happen, or new trends that come [are] adaptable," Desai said. "That's the beauty of having a POCD. It has goals and objectives in a broader sense."

Thinking Of Spring Cleaning? Town Has Recycling Guidelines

ROCKY HILL - Spring has arrived and with is bringing lots of spring cleaning. The town would love to remind you that not everything is recyclable and that there are many resources available when it comes to disposing unwanted goods.

The trash is coming by and it's looking a little too full, you know what that means? There might be some items in that trash can that do not belong there

When it comes to what's recyclable and what's not it gets a little hard to figure out sometimes. You do your best and read all the labels but what about electronics, where do they go? We'll here we are to answer as many questions as we can.

The town offers convenient recycling services for residents, promoting eco-friendly practices that help conserve resources and reduce waste.

With options such as curbside collection and access to the local Transfer Station, the town provides several options for responsible recycling.

Residents have access to the Transfer Station, ocated at 59 Old Forge Rd. The Transfer Station is available for residents only, and proof of residency must be presented upon arrival. No contractors are allowed to use the facility.

The station operates on seasonal hours, with winter hours (Jan. 2 to March 6) on Saturdays from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m., and summer hours (March 6 to Dec. 27) on Thursdays and Fridays from 7 a.m. to 2 p.m. and Saturdays from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m.

The Public Works Director may close the facility during severe weather, including thunderstorms, heavy snow, or hurricanes. If in doubt, residents should call 860-258-2766 on the Friday before an expected weather event.

The Transfer Station accepts various materials, including brush, leaves, grass clippings, computers, TVs, electronics, CDs, tapes, latex paint, tires, 20lb empty propane tanks, furniture, mattresses, scrap metal, household trash, and recyclables.

However, certain materials are strictly prohibited, such as hazardous waste, sheetrock, ceramic tile, roofing materials, concrete, stone, and dirt.

Hazardous waste-including gasoline, brake fluid, mercury thermostats, paint strippers, aerosol cans, pesticides, and pool chemicals-should be taken to an MDC Hazardous Waste Collection Day. Residents can call 860-278-3809 or visit www.TheMDC.com for collection details.

Due to the limited size of the Transfer Station. the number of trips on Friday afternoons and Saturdays may be restricted to one pickup load per resident. Additionally, commercial landscaping vehicles are strictly prohibited per DEEP regulations.

Lynne Witowski, Community Development Services and Joe Lentini, explain that... thing that plugs in should be brought to the transfer station

"Blue recycling carts are for all clean plastic, glass, and cardboard food and beverage containers. Do not place containers from automotive fluid supplies, pesticides, insecticides or pool chemicals," Witowski said. "Recycle carts should not have oily pizza boxes or any plastic containers that didn't have food in them. Those containers should be placed in the trash."

When in doubt follow the golden rule and throw it away.

"Rinse and clean all containers prior to disposal and break cardboard down to fit in cart," said Lentini.

Committee, Town Officials Tweak Community Garden Plan By Liam McGloughlin Staff Writer

ROCKY HILL — Town officials are racing to get the new community gardens open for residents to enjoy and take advantage of this spring.

At last week's Open Space Land Acquisition and Farmland Preservation Subcommittee meeting last week, residents and committee members continued discussions over the preliminary design plans of the garden's configuration.

Ed Ciccarello, a resident and member of the local group "Friends of the Farm," gave a short presentation to the committee outlining some of the components he felt were most important to update on the current plan.

You included 98 beds," Ciccarello said, speaking about the proposed plan. "This is the UCONN study and in the study they recommended 55 beds." He explained that over-tilling the land to make room for a large number of beds could lead to erosion, mud, and weed growth, which are likely to cause unwanted damage.

He also stressed the importance of accessibility, specifically in regards to parking and bed

height. "If I go in from New Road and I park on that road and if I want to walk down, I got to walk down a pretty steep hill. I'm 69, I'm a pretty good walker but I would think we need to design this for people who are mobility challenged," Ciccarello said. "I think you're talking about raised beds — I appreciate that and if we can get some literally off the ground, so we don't have to bend over...I think that would be a nice thing to have.

Members of the committee seemed to react positively to comments from Ciccarello and others at the meeting.

'You do have great ideas," said the director of public works and community development services, Steve Sopelak. "This is a preliminary plan. You know, we're not farmers, we're not experts. We're basing what we're doing on other town's experiences." The surrounding towns Sopelak mentioned included Cromwell, Wethersfield, Farmington and South Windsor.

"I think, as well, there needs to be a little more cooperation with the town," said chairman Francis Whelan. "We need to sit down with your group (to) hear some of your ideas of what you want to go down there and we could give you guys ideas of what the town wants you to focus on...So thank you and please continue communicating with us and we'll try to get you involved as much as possible."

This is an ongoing project, and members agreed that the gardens are unlikely to reach it's final configuration this season.

During the meeting, the committee members took what seem to be the final steps to finalize the plot leasing application, which should become available in the next few weeks. According to discussions, the gardens will be open from May 15 to October 31 of this year, and the number of available plots will depend on the interest from the community.

recycling, managed by Trash Away, if you need to contact them you can do so at (860)-225-1206.

Connecticut has a universal recycling list that outlines which materials are acceptable for recycling. To ensure the effectiveness of the program, all recyclables must be empty, clean and open.

Recyclables should not be shredded, boxed, bagged, or bundled. Items like Styrofoam are prohibited from curbside collection and must be taken to the Transfer Station.

"The residential recycling averages 10% contamination," said Witowski.

"The recycling from our Transfer Station had two contaminated loads in 2024, the loads were accepted by the vendor. The town was issued a verbal written warning to manage it better," Witowski added "The transfer station attendants do a fantastic job monitoring all the disposal areas, keeping contaminants out of disposal dumpsters?

Proper cart placement is also important.

Carts should be placed within four feet of the curb, but not in the street. Keep them at least three feet away from other objects, with the lid facing the street and the handle away from it. Overfilled carts are not accepted-ensure the lid is closed and any large boxes are broken down to fit inside.

"If you're not confident where to dispose of an item, then please ask an attendant. 99% of time we have the solution for any issue and the proper disposal location of item," said Witowski

CROMWELL - Residents will be back at the ballot boxes in a few weeks time to determine the possible addition of solar panel installation for Cromwell Middle School (ĈMS) project.

"I concur if it's outside the scope, I think we should leave it for the time being outside the scope and go with what we're planning on going with, get that done, and move forward" said Waters. "My concern is that they keep adding. Initially there was a surplus, or shall we say there was money to be left over, and being a taxpayer I feel that our bond will come down if they don't spend that money."

In the end, the Town Council approved a motion to set the date for the referendum as May 6, from 12 to 8 p.m. at Cromwell High School.

Other large portions included salaries and benefits, tota more than \$26 million, and purchased fees and services, approximately \$9 million. Manager's office. In a letter to Mayor Lisa Marotta and other local officials, Town Manager Ray Carpentino detailed the anticipated expenditures for the upcoming year. Below are some of the details of the proposed budget, as well as the dates of public hearings and budget workshops that are open to town residents.

The letter served as the introductory note to the more detailed breakdowns for all town departments-their operating costs and total budgets. Rocky Hill uses software called ClearGov to calculate and organize budget proposals, which allows for "ease of use, clarity and transparency to the budget process," according to the letter.

Carpentino goes on to state that, "This proposed budget sets out to sustain a stable financial footing by reducing inefficiencies and setting aside enough capital reserves to fund priority capital projects and address emergencies. It prioritizes reducing reliance on borrowing, minimizing the need for sudden tax increases or service cuts to fund unexpected expenditures while retaining the town's creditworthiness.'

The total of the proposed budget is anticipated to be "\$103,666,114, representing an increase of 3.59% and a mill rate of 30.99, an increase of 1.82 mills." The largest portion of the budget will go to the Board of Education, with an anticipated

Advisory Committee Changes Swing School Site, Focuses On Details In Preparation For Town Vote

WETHERSFIELD - At its March 31, meeting, the Wethersfield Advisory School Building Committee voted to change its recommendation for the swing school location from the Stillman site to the one at Kycia Farm. The new school would be built first in the schedule, current Highcrest students would be moved into it, and subsequent school populations would use the current Highcrest school while their buildings are being renovated.

"I think that the integration of the farm within the new Highcrest school is what really went off it my head as a lightbulb, to see some educational possibilities, not to mention the chance of a new field to be part of the school construction that will allow our sports community to expand its activities, as well," said committee Chair Jon Weiner.

"As a Board of Education member, I actually look forward to bringing some agricultural education into our schools, and I think the tie-in to the Kycia property could lend itself to a nice educational process that we do not have yet," said Weiner.

The master plan would split the construction project into two referendums. The first is to build the school at Kycia farm, then renovate Webb as a 5-6 academy, and then Charles Wright Elementary School. This is now being referred to as "Highland Elementary School for new construction on the Kycia parcel."

The second referendum will be to renovate Emerson Williams, then Hamner, and finally to demolish the original Highcrest school.

Once the Board of Education and the Town Council formally adopt the plan and the schedule, pricing will begin. Numbers for the first referendum will be fine-tuned conceptual estimates, but the cost estimates for work included in the second referendum will necessarily be looser, because the construction is to be several years out.



Wrong-Way Driver **Faces Multiple Charges**

NEWINGTON — A Newington man is due back in court at the end of May on numerous charges, including reckless driving and his third offense of Illegal operation of a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol/ drugs

Aaron Miranda, a Newington native, was arrested by Troop-H State Police personnel for driving the wrong way on Route 5/15 South and I-91 North.

The "investigating trooper," Trooper Nicholas Jones, wrote in his report that Troop-H had received "eleven 9-1-1 calls reporting a black sedan driving the wrong way." Officers responded following these calls and located Miranda near exit 26 on Great Meadow Road.

According to a press release published by the State Police Public Information Office of Media Relations, officers initiated a traffic stop, identified Miranda, and observed "several signs of impairment" during the investigation.

These signs of impairment included a "strong odor of alcohol emanating from the vehicle and the driver's eyes appearing red and glossy," the release said. Miranda also report-

edly told police he had been drinking prior to driving.

"Based on these observations, Miranda was asked to perform the Standardized Field Sobriety Tests, to which he ultimately did not perform to standard. As a result, Miranda was arrested and transported to Troop H for processing for operating under the influence." After arriving at Troop H in Hartford, of-

ficers performed a chemical breath test, which revealed Miranda had a blood alcohol content that "was more than twice the legal limit.

Miranda has been additionally charged with first degree reckless endangerment, failure to drive upon the right side of the road, driving the wrong way on a divided highway, and illegal entry onto a limited access highway.

He was held on a \$10,000 bond, and was due in court on March 31. He has since been released from custody after signing a "promise to appear," according to the Connecticut Judicial Branch website.

The court is currently awaiting a plea from Miranda, and he is due back in court on May

Town To Seek Bids To Repair Current Pools

NEWINGTON — The community pool saga continues as committee members give the "allclear" to send out an RFP to contractors.

In between Town Pool Committee meetings, Jonathan Altshul, met with a pool contractor from "Superior Pools" to learn more about the current status of the town's swimming pools.

In a memorandum submitted on Mar. 19, Altshul wrote, "While both pools have residual water and leaf residue on their floors that made doing a comprehensive visual inspection impossible at the moment, the contractor's overall impression was that both pools are in relatively good condition for their ages and that they may be repairable.

During discussion in the March 24 meeting, Altshul explained that the contractor who evaluated the pool has expertise in concrete repair, rather than as a pool engineer or architect. He added that it was only a visual inspection, and didn't evaluate other key components, such as piping or mechanical elements.

Given the preliminary nature of this study,

'Yes, we need to do a comprehensive study, from the ground up, and that's the way it needs to get done," chairperson Eileen Francolino agreed. The big question regarding issuing an RFP,

however, is its cost. In his memorandum, Altshul stated that he expects an RFP to "exceed the \$30,000 threshold" for a "soup-to-nuts" evaluation of the pools at Mill Pond Park and Churchill Street, which would then require an RFP.

While the town does have \$200,000 allocated in the capital budget for the pools, Altshul explained that the money is primarily needed for getting the pool ready for the season, minor repairs, patches, etc.

A meeting between the committee and the Town Council is expected to discuss the potential for increasing the budget to pay for the study.

Following discussion, committee members voted unanimously to send out the RFP. According to the document, responses are due by April 24, and a decision is due by May 1.

Common Health Issues That Affect Aging Pets

Pet owners, devotion to their companion animals is evidenced in the lengths modern pet parents go to keep their furry friends happy and healthy. A recent survey from GOBankingRates found that 70 percent of pet owners spent between \$600 and \$1,200 on their pets in 2023, which underscores how important companion animals are to the people who take care of them.

Millions of pet owners might admit there's no limit to what they would do to protect their pets, but even the most devoted dog owner or cat caregiver recognizes that age can catch up to companion animals. Much like humans can't stop their own bodies from aging, pet owners have little recourse against Father Time when it comes to caring for their pets. The American Veterinary Medical Association notes that cats and dogs are living longer now than ever before, so it's good for pet owners to familiarize themselves with common health issues that can affect older pets.

Senior pets

The AVMA notes that cats are generally considered 'senior' after 10 years of age. It's a little harder to pinpoint when dogs enter their golden years, as the size disparity between breeds affects their senior status, or lack thereof. The AVMA notes small or toy breeds (less than 20 pounds) acquire "enior" status between eight and 11 years of age; medium-sized breeds (20 to 50 pounds) between eight and 10 years of age; large breeds (50 to 90 pounds) between eight and nine years of age; and giant breeds (more than 90 pounds) between six and seven years of age.

Cancer and senior pets The AVMA reports that cancer is the cause of death in roughly 50 percent of all dogs and around one-third of senior cats. Cancer in pets may produce a variety of symptoms, including: Abdominal swelling

Bleeding from the mouth or nose or other body openings

Difficulty eating or swallowing

Breathing difficulties

Lumps, bumps or discolored skin

Sores that will not heal Persistent diarrhea or

vomiting Decreased appetite or

body weight Swelling, heat, pain, or lameness that cannot be ex-

plained

Additional issues affecting aging pets

Though cancer is responsible for a significant percentage of deaths among senior cats and dogs, itÕs not the only issue that can affect aging pets. The AVMA notes a number of common health problems affect pets as they age, including:

Heart disease: The Animal Medical Center, a New York-based nonprofit orga-



nization, notes degenerative valve disease, dilated cardiomyopathy and heartworm disease are common types of heart disease in dogs. Hypertrophic cardiomyopathy is a common heart disease found in cats.

Kidney or urinary tract disease: The Veterinary Diagnostic Library at Michigan State University notes that chronic kidney disease affects up to 10 percent of aging dogs and 35 percent of aging cats.

Liver disease Diabetes: The AVMA reports that diabetes is most often diagnosed in dogs between the ages of seven and 10 and in cats older than six years of age.

Joint or bone disease Overweight or obesity Vision or hearing loss The AVMA notes senior pets can develop cataracts that affect their vision and may not respond as well to voice commands as they did when they were younger.

Cats and dogs are living longer. Pet parents can prepare for their pets' golden years by learning about common ailments that affect aging animals.

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Newington Hockey Star Shooting to Elm City

After a senior season filled with accolades, Newington High School's Kalyn Reynolds has committed to four more years on the collegiate ice.

"I am excited and grateful to announce my commitment to play hockey and continue my education at Albertus Magnus College," Reynolds announced last fall. "I'd like to thank my family, my coaches and my friends for supporting me."

Reynolds made the decision on her next destination prior to having a season to remember this winter playing for the Nighthawks co-op, a team that consists of players from multiple schools and towns.

Following her final year with the co-op, Reynolds was named Connecticut High School Girls Hockey Association (CHS-GHA) All-State first-team. She also earned all-conference and was named the Central Connecticut Conference (CCC) Player of the Year, along with being selected for the team's Most Valuable Player (MVP) award.

Her success correlated with the team's success as the Nighthawks were named the CHSGHA Team of the Year after winning a total of 15 games and advancing to the state semifinals.

"We all had the same goals, and we all showed up to practice wanting to push each other to become better players," Reynolds said of her final season with the Nighthawks. "That is what made us special." During her four years with the program, Reynolds helped the program capture a pair of conference championships and she finished up with a program-record 42 career goals in the regular season.

Reynolds noted that the individual recognition this winter was rewarding from both a personal and team aspect.

"It means so much," noted Reynolds. "It means that all of my hard work paid off, but I couldn't have done it without my coaches, teammates, and family. They have been a big part of my career."

Reynolds first laced up the skates competitively at the age of nine and quickly found a second home on the frozen pond.

"It's fast paced — you're never not moving," expressed Reynolds, who also played club ice hockey for the Connecticut Northern Lights. "It's super competitive and I get to connect with people that have the same passion as me. I've made so many friends that will be lifelong friends."

In New Haven, Reynolds will join a Falcons program that plays in the New England Hockey Conference (NEHC).

Albertus Magnus was the first college that Reynolds toured, and on that visit, she was instantly sold.

"It had everything I was looking for. It's a small school, which I wanted, and class sizes are small so I knew I wouldn't be just a number," stated Reynolds, who will major in business management with a minor in

WHS Football Center College Bound

After manning the middle for an offense that ran through opponents this past fall, Wethersfield High School senior Mason Everett will continue his football career at the next level.

Everett has committed to Nichols College, where he will play for the Bisons in Dudley, Massachusetts.

He called his next stop a "great destination" and a "perfect match."

"I absolutely loved the school and the coaches were awesome," expressed Everett. "I knew it's where I wanted to be for the next four years."

Everett was recruited to Nichols to play center after anchoring an Eagles offensive line this past fall that ran for 2,405 yards (nearly 220 yards per game) and 37 touchdowns.

Wethersfield head coach Matt McKinnon praised Everett for both his play and leadership along the offensive line.

"He always led by example on and off the field. He was just as much a great student as he was as a football player," McKinnon said of his All-Academic center. "He's committed to excellence with school, in the weight room, and on the field.

This fall, Everett was a senior voice for an Eagles team that had a complete turnaround. In 2023, the Eagles finished winless (0-10) and returned this fall resembling a completely different squad, winning 9 of 10 regular season games to qualify for the playoffs. We wanted to do something special this year, and that's what we did."

The college bound center was primarily a defender in youth football and then shifted to the offensive line in high school before eventually finding his sweet spot in the middle of the offensive line thanks to the encouragement of McKinnon.

"It was struggle at first, but coach was really real positive with me," recalled Everett. "Now I like everything about it. I like to talk a lot, and communicating is a big part. I just like being the leader, the guy in the middle."

Everett will join a college program that competes in the Conference of New England (CNE). He will bolster a potent Bisons offense that averaged 33.3 points per game last season under first-year head coach Vinny Marino.

McKinnon noted that is departing center is ready for the challenges that college football will present.

"Nichols is very lucky to have him," noted McKinnon. "I know he will succeed with school and athletics in his career up there."

Prior to making his way to the Bay State, Everett is finishing up his final sports season at WHS with the Eagles baseball team this spring.

After living in Wethersfield his entire life, Everett noted that a change of scenery is welcome.
